SENATE BILL NO. 3

BY SENATOR ADLEY

Prefiled pursuant to Article III, Section 2(A)(4)(b)(i) of the Constitution of Louisiana.

FUNDS/FUNDING. Requires that federal economic stimulus monies received by the state be used only in accordance with the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. (gov sig)

1 AN ACT

2 To enact Subpart B of Part IV of Chapter 1 of Subtitle I of Title 39 of the Louisiana Revised

3 Statutes of 1950, to be comprised of R.S. 39:138, relative to the appropriation and

4 expenditure of certain funds received from the United States government; to provide

5 with respect to funds received by the state from the United States government for

6 economic stimulus; to direct the Louisiana State Law Institute to designate R.S.

7 39:131 through 137 as Subpart A of Part IV of Chapter 1 of Subtitle I of Title 39 of

8 the Louisiana Revised Statutes of 1950; to provide for an effective date; and to

9 provide for related matters.

10 Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:

11 Section 1. Subpart B of Part IV of Chapter 1 of Subtitle I of Title 39 of the Louisiana
12 Revised Statutes of 1950, comprised of R.S. 39:138, is hereby enacted to read as follows:

13 **SUBPART B. FEDERAL FUNDS RECEIVED FOR ECONOMIC STIMULUS**

14 **§138. Appropriation of funds received through the American Recovery and**

15 **Reinvestment Act of 2009**

16 **Funds received by the state through the American Recovery and**

17 **Reinvestment Act of 2009 shall be appropriated and allocated for spending only**

1 in accordance with the limitations, conditions, and restrictions imposed by the
 2 Congress of the United States on the expenditure of those funds, and for the
 3 following categories only as follows:

21 Section 2. The Louisiana State Law Institute is directed to designate R.S. 39:131
 22 through 137 as Subpart A of Part IV of Chapter 1 of Subtitle I of Title 39 of the Louisiana
 23 Revised Statutes of 1950, and is further directed to replace the term "Part" with "Subpart"
 24 in each place where the term appears in R.S. 39:131 through 137.

25 Section 3. This Act shall become effective upon signature by the governor or, if not
 26 signed by the governor, upon expiration of the time for bills to become law without signature
 27 by the governor, as provided by Article III, Section 18 of the Constitution of Louisiana. If
 28 vetoed by the governor and subsequently approved by the legislature, this Act shall become
 29 effective on the day following such approval.

DIGEST

Proposed law provides that funds received by Louisiana through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 shall be appropriated and allocated for spending only in accordance with the limitations, conditions, and restrictions imposed by Congress on the expenditure of those funds, and for the following categories only as follows:
